## **Peony History and Horticulture**

The Peony Garden at the Nichols Arboretum was established in 1927 by Aubrey Tealdi, the chairman of the Landscape Architecture Department and the Arboretum's first director. Many of the original plants were given to Professor Tealdi by Dr. Walter Upjohn of Kalamazoo, an avid peony amateur, but better known as the founder of the Upjohn Corporation.

The Nichols Peony Collection was outstanding for a number of years and then declined after some years of neglect. Around 1987, a decision was made to restore the gardens, and to the extent possible, reestablish the original historic collection. The Arboretum has been aided notably in this task by a generous grant from the Ann Arbor Chapter of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association and by Brook Lodge Gardens, which donated many varieties from the original Upjohn collection that were lost from the Arboretum's garden.

Today the Peony Garden is one of the outstanding historic collections in the region, containing over 260 "old" varieties introduced to the trade between 1807 and 1948 with most between 1907 and 1925. Restoration and preservation efforts continue and alone could be justified by a single glimpse of the annual spectacle of over 700 peonies in bloom.

#### A Word about Peonies

Herbaceous Peonies, so greatly admired and commonly recognized and planted, are principally derived from crosses and selections of two species. The first is *Paeonia officinalis*, a native of central Europe. This is the Peony of

mythology and of early medicine. The second is *Paeonia lactiflora*, sometimes called the Chinese Peony. It is a native of the central regions of Siberia and central to Eastern Asia. It was introduced into Europe in the mideighteenth century. Peonies are not mentioned in American horticultural literature until 1800, but it is certain that they were here decades earlier.

Peonies do best on a sandy clay or silt clay soil, but are easily grown in almost any soil as long as it is well drained. They do not tolerate poorly drained soil. Plants do best in full sunlight, but they will stand a moderate amount of shade. They should be planted away from trees and shrubbery that compete for water and nutrients.

## **Planting Peonies**

September is the best time to divide existing plants or to plant newly acquired roots in Michigan. This permits new divisions to develop feeder roots before the advent of severe weather. Farther south, October would be as satisfactory. Peonies planted in spring, unless pot grown, sometimes fail because the root development does not keep pace with top growth.

If at all convenient, prepare the planting site in advance of actual planting (see illustration on page 7). A generous amount of well-rotted animal manure is beneficial to Peonies. It is best applied during this early preparation period. It should be mixed well with soil. Place a layer of soil above the fertilized zone so that roots of the peonies do not come in contact with the manure. Preparing the bed in advance permits the manure and chemical elements to bond with soil particles, lessening the chance of root injury, and letting the soil

settle before roots are placed. Some gardeners recommend placing a small handful of commercial fertilizer mixed well with topsoil at the bottom of the plant hole.

Set the new division in an upright position in a hole wide enough and deep enough to prevent the roots from crowding. In Michigan's soils, the buds should be covered by a maximum of two inches of soil. Plants placed too deeply sometimes fail to bloom. Water the new plant well so that the soil settles around the roots eliminating air pockets.

#### **Care and Maintenance**


A soil test is useful to determine the precise amount and fertilizer formulation needed. Usually, however, a handful of a commercial fertilizer, such as 10-10-10, will be adequate to keep plants vigorous. Avoid placing any fertilizer, even well-rotted manure directly over the crown, as it may injure developing shoots. Watering is important. Newly set plants should be watered to a depth of eight to ten inches during the first summer after planting. A summer mulch of old wood chips or other suitable material placed at a depth of two to three inches will conserve moisture and discourage weeds.

In areas of severe winter weather, it is prudent to provide some winter protection, especially the first year after planting. Mound a shovelful or two of earth over the top of the plant. This is useful in a couple of ways. The mound allows excess moisture to drain away from the plant and it also provides protection from alternate freezing and thawing. After the ground is frozen, a mulch placed over the plant will keep the soil frozen and prevent heaving. Marsh hay, straw, evergreen boughs or leaves will all serve this

purpose. The mulch and soil mound should be removed before spring growth begins.

Peonies are generally free of plant diseases. The most common and serious are two fungal diseases, *Botrytis* blight and Phytophthora blight. Each requires good sanitation practice to prevent infection and spread. Spent flowers should be removed before seeds drop within the plant. Stems and foliage of the plants should be removed from the garden and destroyed each fall after they have been killed by hard frost. Botrytis can be controlled by applying Captan, Benlate, or Bordeaux mixture according to the manufacturer's directions. Phytophthora, a more destructive but less common disease, can be controlled with a chemical sold under the trade names of Dithane M-45 or Manzate 200.


#### PLANTING DETAIL



Dig hole wide and deep enough to prevent crowding of peony roots.

2) Provide 1" to 2" for maximum cover over buds.
3) Place 3" of rotted manure well mixed with soil, and cover it with 2" topsoil mixed with approximately a handful of fertilizer e.g. 6:12:12.

Use 5" topsoil mixed with a 1/2 Lb. fertilizer (e.g. 6:12:12) thoroughly mixed.



# How to Use this Guide

Enter and enjoy the Peony Collection! We hope this Guide will serve a wide range of Peony Garden visitors from the casual observer to the learned horticulturist.

Please take a moment to get oriented to the Garden. The Map on the opposite page presents the overall organization. There are 27 Beds, and each has a permanently assigned Bed Number. This number is inscribed on Bed Markers in each corner of each Bed. Find a sample marker and note its location and appearance.

The Bed Maps in this section are arranged numerically from Bed 1 to Bed 27. Bed 1 is located at the west end of the Garden, known as the Washington Heights end. Bed 2 is to the right, then 3 begins a new row as you progress across rows and up the Map ending with Bed 27.

Now turn the page to Bed 1. On the left is a diagram of the Bed with the following information:

166 = Inventory Number (permanently assigned for each existing, identified Peony cultivar).

? = Question Marks indicate an existing, unidentified plant.

X = Open Space in the bed.

On the right page, you will find the Inventory Number. This will give you the Name, Color and Form of the cultivar. Note that Color is presented only in this Bed Map section, and is the same as used by the American Peony Society.



## **Peony Garden Inventory Key**

## *Inv*# = Inventory Number

These numbers are assigned (starting with one) to an alphabetical listing of all Peony cultivars on Nichols Arboretum Peony Garden maps up to and including 1949. (1927, 1932 and 1937, Tealdi and Moody); and 1949, Whittemore and Moody. The complete inventory includes 387 cultivars. At this time, only 260 varieties actually exist in the garden, accounting for gaps in the inventory numbering.

## Name = Variety Name

As listed in the American Peony Society publication, Peonies – Favorites of Greek Gods and Chinese Emperors – A History of Peonies and Their Origins, 1976.

#### Yr = Year

Year introduced into the Trade as reported in above publication.

## Bed = Bed Number

The Peony Garden consists of 27 beds which are approximately 25 feet square (except for irregular beds 2, 5 and 8). Each bed has a number found on markers in each of its corners. Numbering starts at the west end (Washington Heights entry) and progresses to the east.

## Form

Peonies are classified by the varying forms that the flower parts take. There are four distinct types found in the Peony Garden, although the "double" form predominates and includes over 200 varieties.

**S** = **Single**: One or two rows of outer guard petals and a yellow center of stamens.

*J* = Japanese: Five or more guard petals and a center of modified stamens bearing abortive (imperfectly formed) anthers, referred to as stamenoides.

*SD* = **Semi-Double**: Several rows of petals and a yellow center. Five or more guard petals, center of broad petals with many pollenbearing stamens intermixed. Flowers have a more open appearance, so that the stamens and pistils are exposed in the open blossom.

**D** = **Double**: Large, full flowers composed of all petals. Usually the most fragrant. Five or more guards, center of stamens and carpels more or less fully transformed into petals forming full flower.

#### Season

An estimate of the bloom season for each cultivar is based on the total length of bloom season for all cultivars. In the Ann Arbor area, the bloom season is eight weeks, from the third week in May to the second week in July. The average peak bloom time is the second week in June. The following categories are used:

**E** = **Early**: First three weeks of season

M = Mid: Middle two weeksL = Late: Last three weeks

#### Scent

Assessments of scent are largely subjective, depending on the beholder, and vary widely from unpleasant odor to intoxicating fragrance. For this listing, the American Peony Society descriptors have been edited and only two categories have been noted:

F = Fragrant VF = Very Fragrant

# **History of Nichols Arboretum**

Nearly 90 years ago the Arboretum was established with a gift 27.5 acres of farm land from Dr. Walter H. and Esther Connor Nichols, U of M alumni. In 1906, Prof. Frederick C. Newcombe made this case to the Regents:

"In this University we have been able to work without a botanic garden, because we have been able to use the whole surrounding country for our field of study. But one can foresee that in twenty-five years the farmers' woodlots will be put under cultivation for timber, the bogs will be drained, and no land will be left where vegetation can be studied in natural conditions. The land of the proposed donation is ideal for the purpose of bringing together in a small area all the vegetation of this climate, giving to each plant society its characteristic conditions. The tract is made up of hills, ravines, level low land, a bog, and a rivulet. The northern part is sand, and the southern heavy clay."

Newcombe and botany professor George P. Burns, Ann Arbor Park Commissioner, negotiated a joint operating agreement between the City and the University to develop City land along the river and the Nichols Farm as one piece. They envisioned University and City schools being the primary users.

In 1906, the farm field that would become Nichols Arboretum was plotted by Ossian Cole Simonds, a U of M-educated civil engineer and a notable landscape gardener with his own firm in Chicago. Simonds is credited with laying out the basic design of the Arboretum with its hill-hugging roads, broad expanses of lawn, "rooms", and scenic views.


